Message from the Mayor

It has been an honor and a pleasure finishing my first year as your Mayor. The City of Orono had a great 2017 and a great start into 2018. Many infrastructure project improvements were completed including Fox Street reconstruction, and various utility upgrades. We are bringing forward more bids for streets and utility improvements for Spring of 2018. The passing of the Orono budget brought an increase in roads funding while lowering the tax rate for Orono Residents. In 2017 Orono paid off another \$1,000,000 in debt and is on track to be mostly debt free in 9 years!!

Some of the highlights from the City Council this fall & winter are:

- 1. The Lurton Dog Park was opened and in the end we had over 500 permits.
- Stormwater improvements at Cygnet Place, Kelley Avenue & Willow Drive South.
- Approved the Fire Department's dock site plan for the location at Molly's corner so the Fire Department can have direct access to Lake Minnetonka for speedy rescues.
- 4. The Gillespie Center presented their annual address that showed off all that they do for the seniors in our community. After the presentation the Council affirmed our continued financial support.

 System improvements that have been put into place over the last few years.
- 5. Approved the Long Lake Ravine Stabilization Project With the 112 road construction project starting Phase 2 next year at the Old Long Lake Road intersection it is the perfect time to solve and finish the ravine stabilization in this area.
- 7. Approved the 2018 budget and went over all the positive changes that we have implemented at the City Council to enable new housing and construction permits to be up 40%. Our roads budget continues to get more fully funded, we are funding all of infrastructure correctly now, and if your housing value stayed the same in Orono then your Orono taxes portion of your tax bill would go DOWN!!!!! Out of 48 cities in Hennepin County we are at #45 for the lowest taxed city. In 2017 we paid off an additional \$1,000,000 in debt and in 9 more years we will be mostly debt free.
- 8. Approved the WeCan request for a resolution of support for a grant that they are looking to obtain to help further take care of our community.

- 9. We passed a few items on the consent agenda that will keep Orono's Police & Public Works group working at their best. New squad cars for 2018 to replace a few of the aging fleet, replacement of a decades old plow truck that has seen its age, and pickup truck replacements for Public Works.

10. Approved a short term rental ordinance that limits rentals to a minimum stay of 30 days with an exception for an owner occupied/homesteaded house to rent out a room or 2. If you do rent you will need to get a rental license where we can get the house owner information so if any problems do arise we know who to get ahold of. Safety concerns in areas with short term rentals have prompted this ordinance. Rental license applications are available on line at www.ci.orono.mn.us

2017 ITEMS TO WATCH FOR UPDATE:

ROADS & INFRASTRUCTURE - Three years ago at City Council I said I wanted to make sure that we are budgeting correctly in all the areas that the City is responsible for. This means our infrastructure needs to budget for reserves for replacement, and that also means that we need a dependable roads budget. We finished more roads and infrastructure projects than ever before and the Council also selected the next batch of roads to get done in the spring of 2018. Once we see how the roads have fared over the winter we will the select the next few roads for the fall construction season. The engineering part of the spring projects has started so we can go out and get bids and award more road contracts immediately. Your Orono government will continue to keep the city of Orono looking good and updated for generations to come.

PARKS:

With a Parks Commission that has full City Council Support since they were re-instituted a few years ago, we have the opportunity to build on the projects that the commission has accomplished over the last 3 years (Lurton Dog Park, Livingston Park & Saga Hill). The Saga Hill Park project has been approved and has started and when done Saga Hill will be brought back to life as a fully useful Orono Park once again.

The Big Island committee has had 2 cleanup projects already to help restore the walking pathways, cleaning out the docking area so it looks presentable, clearing out areas so they can be mowed, fixing the signage on the island etc... A few Boy Scout Troops, Camp Courage, Home Depot, committee members as well as volunteers came to help out. The excitement is overwhelming and more is planned to help make Big Island more accessible for the future. The Council also has some plans for updating & expanding the use of the Orono Golf Course. Come & visit our next Parks Commission meeting and help us continue the renewal of the Orono Parks System.

ORDINANCES & FEE CHANGES & UPDATES:

With all of the great changes we have made over the last year we have already seen a surge in new construction and new housing permits. When your Orono government decides to simplify the process, lower the costs and bring a can do attitude for the citizens, it is amazing how many more opportunities begin to develop in our city. We all benefit when more people decide to upgrade their homes. This is about making the process easier for Orono residents.

COMMUNICATIONS:

I am enjoying being your Mayor and working with my fellow City Council Members. I have had the opportunity to chat, have coffee, text, email and house visit with many Orono citizens over the last few months again and it is always gratifying to help work through any issues or problems to their conclusion. We will get a lot of work accomplished for the Citizens and I am always available for coffee to discuss Orono. At the City we always put citizens first and that will never change.

Susan E Lurton Off Leash Dog Park - Dogs at Play

Orono is honored to be the home of another great Boy Scout Eagle Project. Jason Brew built a playground for the dogs at the Susan B. Lurton Dog Park in Orono. This project will be used for many years and many dogs will receive the benefit of this awesome Eagle project. The park has become a great gathering place in Orono for dogs and neighbors to meet and mingle. Thank you for giving back to the community and helping the dog park become even better.

The popularity of the Susan E Lurton Off Leash Dog Park remains high and the new 2018 season will feature even more improvements for dogs and their owners alike. Permits are required for use of the park. Permit costs remain the same, \$25 for Orono residents and \$40 for those residing outside of the city. Permit fees go to offset improvements and maintenance in the park.

Recently competed improvements in include installation of paver walkway to clean up the entrance area; debris clearing, restoration of native vegetation and planting of a tamarack grove in the small dog area.

In 2018 the City looks to make trail improvements with a focus on graveling the muddy walkways though the prairie area; continue landscaping efforts to beautify and address erosion issues; and add some additional tables, a response to the popularity of those already in the park.





Rise in Phone Scams

The Orono Police Department has, once again, seen a rise in phone scams over the past couple of months. These phone calls can range in what they are calling for but all have the same agenda; to obtain money by swindling it out of you. These calls are not to any particular group but are most often successful with our elderly population.

Keep in mind these things:

- The Internal Revenue Service(IRS) will never call by phone asking for payment
- Law enforcement will never call by phone asking for bail or bond money
- Never allow anyone to access your computer remotely if asked to do so over the phone

- If you receive a call from a number you don't recognize then don't answer and let it go to voice mail. You can also try and block certain numbers; however, may not be always effective.
- Trust your instincts, if something seems unusual then it probably is. Call other family members/friends/police to ask question before ever giving monies to anyone that is soliciting them over the phone.
- Never give out personal information over the phone or by text

If you or someone you know has been affected by a scam you can contact us to make a report through Hennepin County Dispatch (952-258-5321) to make a report. These cases are difficult to solve and monies lost may be hard to recuperate but we will help in any way possible

Orono Police Department Community Service Dog (K-9)

At the February 12, 2018 City Council Meeting the Orono City Council made a motion to establish a partnership with Can Do Canines in implementing and establishing a Community Service Dog (K-9) program and to accept the donation of Xerxes a 3 year old black lab, as our Community Service Dog. The cost is about \$25,000 to provide service dog training and CanDoCanines.org has donated this to the Orono Police Department. The ongoing cost to maintain food and vaccinations is about \$2,500 per year. Ritchie Anderson of NorthShore Marina donated the first four years of this cost with an option for the fifth year as our official sponsor of our new addition to the Orono Police family. Weight Restrictions in Orono

Weight restrictions are in effect during the spring thaw season. Streets may be posted for weight restrictions any time that road and weather conditions warrant weight limits to protect streets from damage.

The city follows MnDOT scheduling from imposing and removing spring road weight limit restrictions Dates are posted at http://dotapp7.dot.state.mn.us/research/seasonal_load_limits/sllindex.asp or by calling 651-366-5400 or toll free at 1-800-723-6543. These dates generally fall between March 1st and May 15th dependent on weather conditions.

Close the Recycling Gap

About half your home's recyclables never make it to the recycling bin. To reduce all you can, recycle everywhere you can. We do well recycling kitchen items, but our bathrooms, laundry rooms and home offices have lots of recyclables we throw out. - Make it convenient Put a recycling bin, bag or box next to every trash can in your house. Hang a bag on your doorknob for recyclables.

- **Make it fun** Place a basketball rim above the recycling bin so your family can slam dunk their recyclables.
- **Recycle in the laundry room** Recycle laundry detergent and fabric softener bottles, cat litter jugs, dryer sheet boxes and more.
- Recycle in the home office Recycle mail, catalogs, magazines, office supply boxes, paper file folders and tissue boxes.

Organics Recycling

The City of Orono is giving away this half gallon compost bin to **new subscribers** to organics recycling, while supplies last. Currently the only hauler that provides organic recycling in our community is Randy's Environmental Services. **Just bring in your first organics bill to city hall to get your compost bin**. This bin is small enough to fit on countertops and perfect for holding a few days' worth of kitchen compost waste. In order to qualify for a free compost bin, your new subscription must begin after March 2018.

Organic material is great for the soil! Avoid putting organic waste down the garbage disposal as it creates an extra burden on wastewater treatment facilities.

Recycling - Save the Food

Best if used: Understand food labeling



The dates on food labels are generally not expiration dates*, but merely suggestions as to when the product is at its freshest. The grocery industry recently adopted voluntary standards to clear up what product date labels mean.

"Use by" – products with this label should be consumed by the date

listed on the package.

"Best if used by" describes product quality. After that date, the product may not be at peak flavor, but is generally safe to consume.

Use your sense of smell, sight and judgment to determine when food has gone bad. Don't use foods that have developed an off odor, flavor or appearance.

*The only federally regulated food labeling is on baby formula to ensure that the nutrient levels listed on the packaging are accurate until the expiration date. Practice meal planning



- Shop your refrigerator first. Find recipes using ingredients you already have at home.
- Plan out meals for a week–start with your go-to meals. Then make a shopping list.
- Create meals in batches. Freeze them for later use, in portion sizes that you'll want to defrost later.
- · Plan a leftovers night each week to eat it up.

Use it up



- Create an "Eat Me First" bin for the fridge so your family knows what to eat first.
- Write what date an item was opened on the packaging.
- · Can't use it up before it goes bad? Freeze or preserve it!

Community Development

Orono Schools and City Partner to Improve Traffic and Safety on Old Crystal Bay Road

Our Partnership has looked at a comprehensive plan and has found a way to pay for these improvements without using local tax dollars. Old Crystal Bay Road (OCB) between County Road 6, on the North and Wayzata Boulevard (CSAH 112), on the South is the most heavily travelled road maintained by the City. The Road has seen no major improvements since it was first paved in 1971 (47 years ago). OCB has received regular maintenance with pavement overlays in 1985 and 2012 however, there have been no improvements for capacity. Yet, the Orono School District continues to grow in both student population and the facilities they offer their students. From 1967 to Present the City's population increased approximately 22% and the student population increased approximately 28%. The increase in population has the road exceeding capacities during parts of the day; decreasing safety for drivers and children along the length of the corridor. Looking into the future the City and School Partnership has identified a way to maximize safety and improve traffic both on OCB and the school campus. These improvements have a cost, but are designed to accommodate future growth and increased safety measures for students along Old Crystal Bay Road. Comprehensive Plan

The City is working through its update to the Comprehensive Plan with an advisory Committee of residents and business owners. An open house is expected in May and public meetings in June and July. Watch the city website for updates and conformation of meeting time and location. Your voice is important.

Citizen Serve - New Online Permitting System for Orono

The City of Orono is implementing a new online permitting and land use application process. An applicant can apply, pay, and track the process of their permit, all online. You can also apply for a variance or conditional use permit online, and file a complaint. This service is available through the City website on the right hand side of the home page, under Citizen Serve Web Portal. Complaints and land use applications are live now, building permit is expected mid-March.

Citizenship Reminder

BRUSH PILES AND LAWN DEBRIS

Piles of brush and/or other organic material are prohibited, except for properly maintained compost piles. Leaves and grass may not be left in the street, right-of-way, in wetlands or on public or other people's property. Trash, rubbish or refuse must be removed from any property.

CONSTRUCTION HOURS

As a reminder, hours for construction (new homes, remodels, etc.) is regulated by Orono City Ordinance and is restricted to 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., (weekdays) and 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. (weekends and holidays). If you are having problems after hours call the After Hours Dispatch at (952) 258-5321.

OUTDOOR STORAGE

As a reminder, it is the responsibility of property owners to maintain outdoor areas. Exterior storage of all recreational vehicles, boats, debris, and or junk must comply with section 78-1577 of Orono City Code.

Rental Licensing

The City Council recently adopted an ordinance that requires a license for all residential rental properties, except for nursing homes or state licenses residential facilities. The license is available through citizen serve.

Open Book Meeting

Market Value Notice and Appeal Process

Market Value notices are sent to property owners each March. The notice states the estimated market value of a property and its property classification. The estimated market value represents a reasonable approximation of what your property may sell for in the open market based on market conditions and information relating to your specific property.

If a property owner believes the 2017 estimated market value and/or classification of their property is incorrect, they can contact the Assessing Department at 952-249-4640. Property owners may meet individually with the Assessor at the **Open Book Meeting scheduled from 4:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 18, 2018 at Orono Council Chambers, 2780 Kelley Parkway**. Please call the Assessing Department prior to the meeting so that the Assessor can be prepared to discuss your property. Further information about the appeals process is stated on the valuation notice; questions can also be directed to the Assessing Department.



Changes to the McCulley Road Brush Site

The McCulley Road Brush Site was originally opened as a brush drop off site for residents after storm events. The brush site has grown more popular since it was made available year round for residents. However, this location has become a dump site for people other than residents. The Public Works staff has spent a lot of time removing garbage, large stumps, logs and other unacceptable materials dropped at the site.

Starting this spring the McCulley Brush Site will have controlled access. Orono City Council approved 380' of fence, a gate and a manned guard booth to help maintain access to the brush site. Days and hours will be established and the site will be manned by a city employee during the warmer months. The site will be available to residents at no cost. Non-residents and contractors may use the site for a fee of \$8.00/cubic yard to offset the cost of managing the site. A list of acceptable materials along with the days and hours of operation will be available on our website at www.ci.orono.mn.us. Please note that access to the Luce Line Trail will be still available at the site.

2018 Roads



RECONSTRUCTION/ REHABILITATION

2018 Road reconstruction efforts will focus on Old Crystal Bay Road (Wayzata Blvd to CR 6), Wildhurst Trail, West Lafayette Street and Forest Arms Lane (subject to sufficient funding). The projects will in general, include full depth pavement reclamation with spot replacement of the underlying soils. In addition, many of the drainage culverts will be replaced during construction. Pavement reclamation is a process by which the existing bituminous (asphalt) surface is ground and mixed with a portion of the underlying aggregate base. The reclaimed material will be compacted and a new bituminous surface will be placed over the top.

MAINTENANCE

This summer the City plans to complete overlay projects on Minnetonka Highlands, Lyric Ave (Livingston to Blaine) and Leaf Street. The overlay projects will consist of removal of some of the pavement, drainage improvements and installation of a new pavement surface. Pothole filling and some crack sealing will also occur throughout the summer.

SURVEYING AND ENGINEERING


This summer the City will be conducting preliminary work to prepare for projects for 2019.

Stormwater and the Environment

Easy Ways to Reduce Water Pollution

Best Management Practices (BMPs) are actions you can take to reduce nonpoint source pollution. Even if you don't own waterfront property, the things you do to your home, farm, and yard directly impact the quality of our lakes, streams, and wetlands. The stormwater that passes over your land, driveway, and sidewalk travels directly from your property to the nearest body of water (lake, stream or wetland). The runoff entering your curbside storm drain is not "cleaned" or treated before entering our lakes, streams or wetlands.



automotive fluids, pet or farm animal waste, and other debris. Listed below are BMPs you can practice at your home or farm to reduce nonpoint source pollution. See how you can reduce one of our largest pollution problems today.

Household Best Management Practices (BMPs)

- Sweep up yard chemicals that spill onto hard surfaces.
- Clean up pet waste and dispose of it in the trash. Pet waste contains nutrients as well as harmful bacteria.
- Sweep grass clippings off the street, driveway, or sidewalk after mowing. Grass clippings can add phosphorus to our waters.
- Remove leaves and other plant debris from the street.
- Don't pour any waste down the stormdrain.
- Wash your car on the lawn or take it to a commercial car wash. Waste water at a commercial car wash is treated through the sanitary sewer system.
- Plant a rain garden.

- Allow stormwater and melting snow to soak into your yard as much as possible.
- Direct your downspout to your lawn or into a rain barrel for watering at a later date.
- Avoid directing runoff onto hard, impervious surfaces such as the driveway or sidewalk.
